We had three very successful summer reading programs.

- Reptiles by Sciencenter had 43 adults and 21 children in attendance
- Story Laurie had 12 kids and 8 adults in attendance
- Didgeridoo had 21 kids and 6 adults in attendance.

Attendance is still a not as large as it was pre-Covid, but I feel we are on our way back to in-person programming.
